



### How to use your PLC to boost your learning


- 1. Collect PLC from teacher
- 2. Complete the checklist

**RED** – No notes – I remember very little; I couldn't answer many questions

AMBER – I have some notes – I remember some aspects; I could answer questions and gain maximum of half marks

**GREEN** – Good notes, I could answer questions and get two thirds of the marks correct

3. Use the RAG ratings to help you choose the aspects of topics to focus your revision on.



### Preparing to revise

- Students have access to many revision resources:
  - Online revision sites
  - Apps
  - Revision guides
  - Exercise books













### **Very Effective**

- **Self-testing and quizzing:** completing past papers, multiple choice questions or practice answers
- **Spacing:** doing little bits of work often and revisiting over time instead of cramming (in some studies, spacing instead of cramming has resulted in a 30% difference in final test results)

### **Fairly Effective**


- Elaboration: asking yourself or explaining 'why is this true' or 'why might this be the case'
- Interleaving: when you mix up the types of problems you answer

### **Limited Effectiveness**

- Highlighting/underlining
- **Re-reading:** in one study, students were most likely to rate re-reading as being more effective than retrieval (testing); however, the students who mainly used testing remembered 50% more than those who had just read for revision

### Spaced learning and interleaving

- **Spaced practice** involves preparing early for exams and setting time aside each day to revise content, alongside completing homework. Setting aside 15-20 minutes per day to review Year 10 work.
- **Interleaving** is the process of mixing up different subjects and topics in order to continue revising the core content for all subjects. Blocked practice means spending time on one topic before moving on to another. However, Interleaving has been shown to be more effective for long-term retention.

### Supporting each student's aspiration and motivation at home

- Student expectations of what grades they will achieve have been shown to have a strong correlation with the grades they actually achieve.
- Students' perceived value of, and personal interest in, academic tasks and content also strongly relates to their motivation to succeed in these tasks.
- When talking with your child about their GCSEs, aim to keep the focus on the following:
  - **High Aspirations:** What's the best you can aim for?
  - Value of exams and education: Tools to unlock a world of freedom and choice

### Supporting wellbeing at home

- A quiet place to work, ideally away from distractions
- Encourage a realistic and reasonable homework and revision timetable, with a focus on the challenging subjects rather than those they find easy
- Interleave learning at home; revise topics studied a while ago, not those they are currently studying in class
- Encourage breaks!
- Encourage healthy eating
- Encourage 8 ½ -9 hours of sleep per night
- Sensible management of screentime
